



**25th Edition of NUGA Games, Makurdi 2017:
BUK Wins 13 Medals, Placed 9th Out of 60 Varsities
... Victims of Robbery Compensated**

Bayero University has won a total of 13 medals, 3 Gold, 4 Silver and 6 Bronze and placed ninth position out of the 60 Universities that participated in the just concluded 25th Edition of Nigeria Universities Games Association (NUGA), tagged: 'Makurdi 2017.'

Three Gold were won in Judo, Taekwondo and female Basketball team, two Silver in Taekwondo, another Silver each in Judo and Men singles of Table tennis event and two bronze medals in Women double and mainstream events of table tennis, while four bronze were won in Judo and shut put respectively.

Meanwhile, all the 26 members of the Bayero University sports contingent that were attacked by Armed Robbers on their way to Makurdi mid-night of Wednesday, 19th April, 2017 who were to participate in the just concluded 25th Edition of Nigeria Universities Games Association (NUGA), tagged: 'Makurdi 2017,' were compensated by the University management.

Of the 26 victims that were compensated, 23 were athletes comprising male Basketball team, the female Handball team, SUG Sports Director and the Deputy Director, Administration of the Sports Directorate, Malam Usman Salihu as well as the driver of the bus.

The Deputy Vice Chancellor, Administration, Professor Adamu Idris Tanko who visited the contingent in Makurdi on Friday, 28th April, 2017, told the athletes that the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, Management and the entire members of the University Community were seriously saddened and disturbed by the unfortunate incident and extended their sympathies to all the victims.

He said as part of efforts to assuage the agony of the robbery incident as well as to encourage the athletes and to strengthen their output, 'the Vice Chancellor has directed me to convey his approval to compensate all of you, who were victims of the robbery incident,' Professor Tanko revealed.

The DVC expressed happiness over what he called the information reaching the management regarding the

good conduct exhibited by the athletes during the opening ceremony of the event, which had earned the university's contingent commendation. He urged them to maintain the tempo.

Professor Tanko assured the athletes that the university management was fully behind them, urging them to go all out to win more laurels for the university.

He thanked the coaching crew and the officials led by the Director of Sports, Professor Rabi Muhammad and the Chairman of Sports Consultative Committee, Professor I.K. Abdulsalam for exhibiting good leadership skills.

Minister of Agric Confident that CDA/NIAS Training Workshop will Transform Livestock Industry

The Minister of Agriculture and Rural Development, Mr. Audu Ogbeh, has expressed confidence that the training workshop organized by the Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA) in conjunction with the National Institute for Animal Science (NIAS) will boost the Livestock Industry, thereby re-engineering economic growth.

Delivering a goodwill message at the opening ceremony of the two-day Training Workshop on 4th May, 2017 with theme: “Commercial Pasture Development as a Tool for National Livestock,” Mr. Ogbeh, who was represented by Malam Mohammed Shehu Adam, expressed optimism that all the participants would derive maximum benefits from the training, adding that “we shall make this important sector more robust and profitable and ensure that it contributes maximally to the nation's non-oil sector.”

The Minister called on all the relevant stakeholders to take advantage of the training by investing the knowledge to be gained in commercial pasture production as a panacea to solving the acute shortage of available pasture so as to encourage the sedentrization of pastoralists.

Mr. Audu Ogbeh stressed the importance of Livestock Industry as an essential component of general agriculture in Nigeria, which had the capacity for earning revenue for governments at all levels, providing employment, food, farm energy, manure, fuel and transport.

Also in his goodwill message, the Commissioner for Agriculture, Kano State, Malam Nasiru Yusuf Gawuna, who was represented by the Director

General, KNARDA, Professor M.I. Daneji, said the training workshop was timely and apt, as it would address the frequent clashes between farmers and pastoralists. He said the clashes have led to loss of many lives and property worth billions of naira. He commended the CDA and NIAS for organizing the

workshop and expressed the Kano State Government's readiness to implement the outcome. The Commissioner also praised the giant strides of CDA for offering to train 500 of the 729 extension workers newly employed by Kano State Government.

In his welcome address, the President, Nigerian Institute of Animal Science, Professor Folorunso I. Adu, said the workshop was futuristic as it was relevant to tackling the existing menace of farmer-herdsman conflict that had become the metaphor of national livestock practices.

He said the workshop aimed at heralding a national transformation in livestock production through a deliberate paradigm shift from national independence on natural pasture for national herbage to a systematic commercial pasture production system with predictable benefits and increased national average in livestock productivity.

Earlier, the Director, Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA), Professor Jibrin M. Jibrin, who was represented by Deputy Director, Training, Professor S.G Mohammed, said Pastoralist-Farmer clashes in many parts of the country had impaired agricultural development in general and animal production, in particular.

He said part of the problems leading to the conflicts and low productivity was the inadequacy of feeds for animals. “For this reason, there is the need to promote the production of pasture as a sustainable source of feeds

for animals”.

Declaring the workshop open, the Director said the workshop was to train pastoralists, farmers, youth and women that would form a critical mass of entrepreneurs for the commercial production of pasture and herbage for national livestock production.

Accreditation Exercise Always Strengthens BUK – Prof. M.Y. Bello

As part of the efforts to ensure the maintenance of standard in line with the requirements of the National Universities Commission (NUC), Bayero University has established Quality Assurance Unit in each of its faculties, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello has disclosed.

He was speaking when he received a team of accreditors from the Architect Registration Council of Nigeria, who were at the university to assess facilities and other requirements of the newly introduced Department of Architecture.

Professor Bello said Bayero University had always regarded accreditation exercise as an avenue where 'our strength, successes and shortcomings are observed, pinpointed with a view to enabling us to make the necessary amends. This has always strengthened us as a citadel of learning,' he revealed.

The Vice Chancellor thanked the Architect Registration Council for their advisory visit to the university, adding that Bayero University management had always made sure that before it introduced any new programme, all the necessary requirements would be put in place. 'The new Architecture programme introduced is not an exception. 'We have completed the architecture block, built studios God willing, before the students reach level 400, they will be provided with all that are necessary for the programme,' he assured.

Professor Yahuza Bello stated that BUK would certainly

benefit from the council's observations and criticisms, saying that 'we are eager to hear from the Council the areas where we are weak so that we quickly make amends for the success of the programme.' He explained.

He said the university's doors are wide open for all relevant professional bodies to come and see and assess what they were doing, offer advice as well as to guide the university's management. 'We will make sure that your pieces of advice are fully implemented. We shall not in any way compromise quality and that is why BUK is where it is today among its peers.'

Earlier, the leader of the team, Architect M.K. Ahmadu, had told the Vice Chancellor that the Architect Registration Council of Nigeria is the regulatory body charged with the responsibility of regulating the profession of architects, adding that the council works hand in hand with the National Universities Commission (NUC). While the NUC carries out academic accreditation, the council often looks at the professional aspect of accreditation.

He said the Council was in BUK to scrutinize facilities including academic staff of the newly introduced Architecture programme and to offer advice and suggestions on how to improve so that graduates the programme will produced could be able to compete favourably with other graduate of similar field worldwide.

Prevention of Meningitis and Lassa Fever

Prevention of meningitis is key to its control as the disease can kill within few hours. People should therefore avoid crowded environment and ensure adequate ventilation, ensure personal hygiene and practice regular hand washing. Vaccination is however the most important preventive measure to take. This was the advice given by speakers at a public enlightenment lecture on the twin public health hazards.

Dr. Bashir Abba, from WHO Kano, was the first speaker, while delivering his lecture at Musa Abdullahi Auditorium during the public lecture on MENINGITIS AND LASSA FEVER. The title of his paper was

MENINGITIS: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW. He defined Meningitis as an inflammation (swelling) of the meninges, which is a membrane covering the brain and spinal cord. He mentioned the cause of meningitis, which are usually caused by bacterial organism which is called "Meningococcus Niesseria". The bacterium is transmitted from person to person via direct contact. He mentioned the symptoms, how it is diagnosed, how meningitis is treated and how to reduce close contact with patients.

Still on meningitis, Dr. Mohammed Hamza, the second speaker presented his paper titled: EPIDEMIC

MENINGOCOCCAL MENINGITIS where he defined the meaning of meningitis and gave the determinants of epidemic meningitis, its risk factors, its mode of transmission, pathophysiology, clinical feature, treatment and prevention.

Lassa Fever is a severe illness caused by Lassa Virus harbored by rats (*Mastomys Natalensis*) and the disease was discovered in 1969 by John Frame. This was according to the third speaker Dr. Imam Wada Bello who delivered his lecture titled: LASSA FEVER AND CSM OUTBREAK IN KANO 2017. On the prevention of the disease, he said people should try to avoid contact with rats and should store their foodstuff in safe places where rats cannot come in contact with them. He mentioned the symptoms of the disease and how to prevent it. He said that ten cases of Lassa Fever were suspected in Kano.

Ibrahim Nashabaru, the last speaker at the event,

presented his paper titled: LASSA AND OTHER VHFS: WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW. Just like the third speaker, he also mentioned the lassa fever symptom: viral hemorrhagic fever. On treatment and prevention he said the most important step is to report any suspect with Lassa Fever to the Ministry of Health Kano, so that they can take care of the patient and prevent other people from contacting the disease.

The event was organized by the University Health Services (UHS) and it was chaired by the Vice Chancellor who was represented by the Director, Public Affairs, Ahmad Shehu, who commended the initiative of the University Health Services, which would go along way in creating awareness about the two diseases and their prevention. In her remarks, the Director UHS, Dr. Maryam Sarki Waziri said the programme was aimed at sensitizing members of the University Community towards prevention of the outbreak of these diseases.

I Came Across a Traditional Medicine that Can Help Cure AIDS – A University Don

A university don, Professor Yalwa Gwarzo, has claimed that he once came across a traditional medicine that could cure the deadly disease, AIDS. He disclosed this during a paper presentation at the Convocation Arena of Bayero University, Kano, on the 3rd May, 2017. The University lecturer was among the lead paper presenters in an International Conference on Traditional Medicine organized and conducted by the Centre for Research in Nigerian Languages, Translation and Folklore between 2nd and 4th May, 2017. The Professor also revealed that traditional and modern modes of treating patients were like twins.

In his keynote speech, Professor Lawal Alhassan Bichi emphasized that there were diseases which hospitals had failed to treat, but were successfully treated with traditional means. Professor Bichi was of the view that the two kinds of medicine would continue to exist and be patronized by patients till the end of the world.

Earlier, the Vice Chancellor of the University, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, aptly represented by his Deputy (Admin), Professor Adamu Idris Tanko, revealed the university's readiness to, in a way, support the two modes of treatment. He also urged the Nigerian

government to give the traditional mode of treatment the attention it deserved.

Also, in a lead paper presentation, Professor Aliyu M. Bunza of Usmanu Danfodio University, Sokoto, pointed out that treating patients should be taken as an issue of a trust by traditional healers. Therefore, traditional medicine men and women should always abide by the ethics of the profession. They should make sure they gave their patients medicines that would certainly cure them. “*In ba ka warke ba, magani bai yi ba*” i.e. “If you (as a patient) are not healed, then treatment has not been achieved”.

Also, the representative of Yobe State Commissioner of

Health, Dr. Babagana, called for a strong synergy between modern and traditional medicine practitioners with the view of bringing progress to the nation. He advised both federal and state governments to give the needed support to both traditional and modern methods of treating Nigerians.

Highlights of the occasion was a skill display by *Sarkin Wanzamai*, (Leader of traditional barbers) using a sharp knife to slice his eyes with no effect. The same head of barbers carried out a “*Kaho*” (a Hausa treatment method of bloodletting) on a plastic chair, from which he extracted “blood”, which he poured onto a white sheet of paper before the amazed audience.

A renowned scholar and preacher, Sheikh Aminu Ibrahim Daurawa has said that business can only thrive under the atmosphere of sincerity, truthfulness and open minded transactions conducted under the principle of Islamic ways.

Editorial Policy

Kano Studies is a Bayero University multidisciplinary journal covering a variety of subjects and issues on the Savannah and Sudanic regions primarily, but with interest in related subjects from wider regions of the world. It publishes original articles of high academic standard in English, Arabic, French and Hausa languages twice a year.

Articles Format

1. The journal calls for well researched articles, which should normally not exceed a maximum of 16 pages of A4 size paper including references.
2. Articles should not be under consideration for publication elsewhere in any form or in another language outside the languages of Kano Studies.
3. Articles should be typed using 12pt font size, Times New Roman, double-spaced with 2.2" margins top and bottom and 1.6" left and right
4. Articles should preferably be in MS Word format.
5. Articles should be submitted together with an abstract of maximum of 250 words written in single spacing. However, all abstracts must be written in English.
6. All photos, drawings, diagrams, illustrations and other images in the manuscript should be in digital format, preferably as JPEG or GIF files and their positions clearly marked in the text.
7. Captions and raw graph data should be provided separately from diagrams and photos.
8. For articles in Arabic, the rules of the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London, must be followed.
9. Authors should use APA (in-text citation) style in acknowledging sources. All works consulted should be cited at the end of the article under the heading "References" in the following format:
 - a. **Books**
