

## 52nd Congregation: BUK Adopts New Criteria for PG Study Abroad By Lamara Garba

he Management of Bayero University has adopted He pointed out that, based on the new criteria, the new criteria for approving Postgraduate fellowship study of teaching staff abroad, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, has revealed.

Speaking at the 52<sup>nd</sup> Congregation meeting at Mahmud Tukur Theatre on Saturday, 21st April, 2018, the Vice Chancellor said under the arrangement only courses that are not offered in BUK and or any Nigerian University would get sponsorship for foreign studies.

Equally, he said the Management and Council of the

University set as criteria for foreign sponsorship based on the number of PhD holders in the respective department.

"The only funding source available to the university now is the annual TETFund's Academic Staff Training and Development grant. Since it costs a lot to train one person abroad only a fraction of applicants can be supported. Consequently, the University Management and Council have set criteria for treating the applicants. Such criteria include the availability of the programme in BUK and Nigeria and number of PhD holders in the department," said the Vice Chancellor.

According to Professor Yahuza Bello, training a PhD abroad will cost between N20 million in developing country and N50million in developed country per person.

University can only afford to sponsor three PhD students to study abroad and therefore, in view of the high number of applicants, it will take about 17 years to be able to clear the current waiting lists.

He also disclosed that the University had expended about N72 million to sponsor over 300 teaching and non teaching staff to attend conferences, study fellowships and workshops in four months period of August, October, November and December 2017.

> The breakdown indicates that 217 teaching staff were sponsored to attend various conferences and 27 others were on fellowship at a cost of N63,911,859 while 52 Nonteaching attended conferences and 12 others were on fellowships which estimated at N7,511,380 respectively.

> The Vice Chancellor, who commended the University staff for their support and commitment assured that the management would continue to reciprocate this gesture by ensuring judicious utilization of the resources.

Meanwhile, the Congregation in its resolution applauded the

university management on the success of the full accreditation status to all the programmes presented to the NUC. The Congregation in session also decried the financial constraints associated with foreign fellowship and advised staff to pursue their postgraduate programmes locally and may wish to apply for bench work outside the country.

The resolution, signed by the Chairman, Professor Ibrahim Baba Yakubu, advised that the Dress Code Committee should ensure strict compliance to the university dress code. It urged the management to ensure the regulation of the activities of Business Centre Operators. Similarly, members of the congregation advised the Housing Allocation Committee to take appropriate measures that will ensure effective allocation to qualified staff.

### 28<sup>th</sup> Professorial Inaugural Lecture: **Business Approach Through Wealth Creation Remains the Only Antidote to Poverty Reduction – Prof. Kurfi**

Administration, Bayero University, Professor Aminu K. Kurfi, has identified the causes of the failure of the strategies adopted by successive administrations in the country to lack of addressing the prevalence of poverty in the society.

He said one of the reasons for the failure of past strategies was that all the policies geared towards eradicating poverty



were not actually being implemented to ensure wealth creation, because, according to him, the real expected beneficiaries were not fully involved in the formation and execution of the strategies.

Professor Kurfi, who delivered the 28th Professorial Inaugural Lecture titled: Microfinance as an Elixir for Poverty Alleviation and Wealth Creation in Nigeria, on Thursday, 19<sup>th</sup>April, 2018 at Musa Abdullahi Auditorium, New Campus, argued that past government interventions from independence to date, including various global and continental diagnostic and prescriptive initiatives of addressing development focused on poverty alleviation, could not achieve the desired objectives, saying that victory in this difficult struggle hinged on taking a business approach to poverty reduction through wealth creation, not the other way round.

X-raying the phenomenon of poverty, Professor Kurfi said essentially, three common concepts of poverty exist: Absolute Poverty, Relative Poverty and Social Exclusion. According to him, absolute poverty denotes a condition of severe lack of human needs, such as safe drinking water, food, shelter, health and sanitation facilities; information and education. Relative poverty, on the other hand, refers to a condition characterized by lack of the minimum amount of income necessary to sustain an average standard of living. Social Exclusion, however, is a complex multidimensional process. It is the lack/denial of goods and services, resources, rights and ability to partake in normal

n erudite scholar and Professor of Business relationships and activities accessible to the majority in the society, whether in political, social, economic or cultural arenas.

> Poverty, the scholar reasoned, had become an issue difficult to ignore in Nigeria today. In fact, to eliminate poverty and achieve a moderately well-off living standard for the people was a generation-old dream of African nations, adding that to eradicate mass poverty and the

> > scourge of diseases and under-development in Nigeria and Africa in general, there was the need to master the techniques of wealth creation and to gather the political will to distribute the wealth so created more equitably amongst the people.

> > These two concepts of poverty alleviation, and wealth creation could not be separated; poverty alleviation was simply about lifting the poor out of poverty which could mean giving a man fish in order for him to survive. Wealth creation, he explained, is all-encompassing. It entails teaching a man how to find his food by means of inculcating the requisite income generating skills; showing a man the way to the river or farm, instead of giving him fish or food to eat.

Professor Kurfi said these were empowerment strategies, which entailed many issues, including inculcating the entrepreneurial spirit in the minds of people, so as to prepare them for wealth creation through micro and small scale enterprises. He stated that entrepreneurship was a must to national development, poverty eradication, wealth creation and employment generation.

The erudite scholar further explained that wealth creation meant the strengthening of the linkages between rural and urban economies, improving the rural infrastructure, encouraging the development of micro, small and medium scale enterprises, facilitating the provision of microcredits, enhancing local capacity through entrepreneurial skills acquisition and striving to achieve a more broadbased economic growth. He added that the place to start was the government, which should provide indisputable leadership in replacing poverty obsession with wealth creation consciousness in Nigeria and Africa in general.

Professor Kurfi added that, at the end of the day, the success of government would be measured not by the number of offices or tall buildings and roads that it constructed, but by the range of opportunities that the government provided for jobs to be created, for all citizens to have enough and nutritious three square meals on their tables, decent accommodations and access to health and sanitary facilities, educational opportunities and other fortunes of life.

The former Vice Chancellor of University of Maiduguri, Professor Abubakar Mustapha, has advised government and agencies under the Federal Ministry of Education to find a way of utilizing the potential bestowed on some retired civil and public servants in the country in the quest to achieve the developmental agenda.

Professor Mustapha was speaking at the Centre for Islamic Civilization and Interfaith Dialogue (CICID) on Saturday, 14<sup>th</sup> April, 2018, where the Department of Islamic Studies, Bayero University honored some retired staff, who had diligently served the University for about 40 years each. Those honored included Dr. Umar Farouk Malumfashi and Dr. Ahmad Muhammad Ibrahim, the founder of Darul Hadith Foundation in Kano.

share their report with him. He said all the programmes in BUK were fully accredited by COREN.

"The accreditation is aimed at building not destroying and only COREN can give the verdict to this visitation. Also, any institution running Engineering programme that is not

accredited or has expired accreditation is illegal. It is against the act establishing COREN, as Section 1b of Decree 55 1970 and 27 of 1992 (amendment) now Engineering Registration Act of E11 of 2004 empowers COREN to determine what standard of knowledge and skill is to be attained by persons seeking to become registered engineers and to raise those standards from time to time as circumstance may require," he added.

In his response, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, said the University welcomed accreditation teams at all times and regarded the exercise as a peer review process and professional progression. He said the University was lucky to have a high caliber team that comprised academics, members of industry and a lawmaker, the

Honorable Engineer Abdullahi Faruk, representing Birnin Kebbi/Kalgo in the House of Representatives from Kebbi State.

The Vice Chancellor told the team that the University did not play with the issue of quality assurance. He said that recently the University approved the establishment of a quality assurance mechanism and a quality assurance policy was enacted. He added that committees were formed in every faculty.

Prof Bello noted that the University was preparing to welcome any accreditation team even without notice, because of its determination to provide all the necessary tools for teaching, learning and research, saying that things should be provided not because of accreditation, but because they were required.



Professor Mustapha, who was the Chairman of the occasion, charged that while other nations were tapping
