## BUK is Safe for Foreign Scholars - *Prof. Stringer* ... To Sign MoU with University of Leeds

he Vice Chancellor of Bayero University, Kano, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, has reiterated the willingness of the University to foster partnership with researchers and institutions from all over the world. He said Bayero University and University of Leeds would sign a MoU to boost various scholarly opportunities.

The Vice Chancellor, who was speaking on Monday 5<sup>th</sup> February 2018 during a courtesy call in his office, expressed delight that the public lecture to be presented by Professor Lindsay Carman Stringer of Leeds University in the UK came at a right time, saying that he was overwhelmed with the courage of the University don to accept the invitation and come to Nigeria despite travel advice discouraging travelers to many parts of the country.

Professor Bello who was represented by the Deputy Vice Chancellor (Academics), Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, during the courtesy visit said, the lecture titled "Towards sustainable futures: a 'nexus' approach for

On her part, Professor Stringer thanked the Vice Chancellor and his management team for the invitation extended to her to visit Bayero University. She added that there was more to again by both institutions by signing a MoU to boost opportunities for actualizing student and staff exchange and joint research proposals for various international research grants.

Professor Abbas who was the chairman during the lecture that took place at the Faculty of Earth and Environmental Sciences (FEES) handed the Nigerian flag to Professor Stringer whose visit to Nigeria brings to 99 the total number of foreign countries she had visited so far.

Professor Stringer was accompanied by Dr. Uche Okapara, a research fellow at Leeds University's Sustainability Institute who also presented his work on

Tuesday 6th February at the Centre for Dryland Northern Nigeria. She added that she was excited with Agriculture (CDA) of Bayero University.

His well-received presentation was on the security implications of the drying out of the Lake Chad. While at the CDA, Professor Stringer took part in the NUC instituted documentary film on the World Bank funded centres of excellence in Nigeria. Many postgraduate students and staff also discussed their research works with her.

Meanwhile, Professor Lindsay has gone to the social media, debunking the negative media against visiting the courage, hospitality and scholarship she had seen in Bayero University.

She noted her observance of more religious tolerance and gender sensitivity in Northern Nigeria that she often saw in the UK. Professor Stringer had since returned to the UK. ## Strike: BUK JAC Announces Total Withdrawal of Concession

Committee (JAC) for the three non-teaching staff unions comprising the Senior Staff Association of Nigerian Universities (SSANU), the Non-Academic Staff Union (NASU) and the National Association of Academic Technologists (NAAT) had withdrawn all concessions given to the University management, saying the strike was absolutely total.

The JAC asked all drivers, cleaners, secretaries and other staff under the three unions to vacate offices with immediate effect, saving the adamant attitude of the Federal Government is due to the concessions that had been given by the JAC at various universities across the country.

The JAC said it would disconnect the University with

The Bayero University Branch of Joint Action electricity, water and other services, saying the three unions embarked on strike nationwide since 4<sup>th</sup> December, 2017 and vowed to ensure that no stone would be unturned in the effort to press their demands. The JAC said the adamant attitude of the Federal Government to resolve the lingering problem would not deter them to fight to the last.

> Reports from various universities across the nation indicated that the strike was doing no good to the environments with other stakeholders and even the management staff of various universities faulted the government for the mute attitude to resolve the crises. Already, the strike is taking a new dimension with the JAC at the national level heading to the court on Monday to file case against the police and DSS for alleged harassment of their members in Lagos and Enugu.

BUK *Bulletin* reports that JAC members in majority of the universities are receiving the sympathy of their university managements, even as the Academic Staff Union of Universities' (ASUU) threat to also further their demands seem not to be respected by the Federal Government. The ASUU also is noted to have directly and indirectly been affected by the on-going JAC strike, as academic activities keep on deteriorating in the universities across the country.

Already, a series of meetings were held by JAC officials across the universities; they expressed concern for the nonchalant attitude of the government in addressing the issue, which a few weeks ago, was about to be addressed by the National Assembly through its Committee on the Tertiary Education and TETFund, headed by Honourable Sulaiman Goro, if not because of the alleged absence of the Minister of Education, Malam Adamu Adamu and Minister of Labour Christ Ngige during the meeting.

In Bayero University, there was a JAC Congress meeting last Wednesday. A day to the Congress, SSANU had convened a joint meeting with its Advisory Committee at its secretariat in the Old Campus, where it was unanimously decided to withdraw all the concessions granted to the University management in the provision of skeletal services at Academic Office, School of Postgraduate Studies, Office of the Vice Chancellor, Registrar's Office, CIT, Power House and other sensitive offices and workshops/laboratories.

SSANU had delegated its Advisor Committee to meet

with the Registrar and some directors in the effort to further communicate to them the JAC decisions about the strike. The JAC had already decided to impose stringent measures in dealing with erring members, who violated the strike.

The SSANU Chairman, Comrade Haruna Aliyu, and other officials of the JAC have resolved to conduct a daily monitoring of all the campuses to ensure total compliance. They expressed concern that the JAC began the indefinite strike on December 4<sup>th</sup>, 2017 due to the alleged non-implementation of the agreements they entered with the Federal Government in 2009 and 2017.

JAC said the contentious issues consisted of the earned allowances of N23 billion released by the Federal Ministry of Education in which the three unions under JAC received only 11 percent and the demand for more funds to its members, as they were not satisfied with the sharing formula of the Federal Government.

Some JAC members told BUK *Bulletin* that their willingness to provide skeletal services in their respective schedules was because of the sympathy they had on students, especially the new students admitted to the University recently. They also admitted the fact that the University management and JAC had a cordial relationship.

However, the resolution of the JAC congress directed all their members to vacate their offices with immediate effect as done by some universities.
