# We Create Opportunities for All to Study in BUK – VC

The Vice Chancellor of Bayero University, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, has reaffirmed the commitment of the University in providing opportunities and in encouraging all categories of people to acquire knowledge in the University, including the indigent, the elderly and the physically challenged.

Speaking on Tuesday, 1<sup>st</sup> May, 2018, when he was hosted on Kano's popular *Barka Da Hantsi* programme of Freedom Radio, he said the 25 part-time degree programmes introduced and run by the University at its School of Continuing Education, Goron-Dutse Campus, were aimed at capturing people who could not attend school from Monday to Saturday and as such, the students were assembled on Fridays and Saturdays for their lectures.

Professor Bello expressed delight that the mission for the setting up of the school was achieved because the targeted groups, who had lost hope in furthering their education to the degree level, were given such an opportunity to enroll. They came on Fridays from Lagos, Abuja and other parts of the country for lectures. He explained that the curricula for the part-time degree programmes was the same with those offered by regular students in the University, only that the former have to go through five years to complete their studies.

The Vice Chancellor said more ways were being identified in the University to help female students and the physically challenged as well as the indigent who lacked the means to sponsor their studies. These initiatives included creating crèches in the campuses and conveniences specifically for female students; creating opportunities and accesses for the physically challenged and initiating several scholarships for indigent students to study in the University. The University, he said, identified those needing such help during registration and from their respective departments.

He urged wealthy individuals and organizations to join the efforts of some noble people who provided scholarships for students and helped the University to provide facilities that could facilitate development in the country and the society. He said the door was open for those wishing to help towards building the fortunes of the University. He commended the initiative of TETfund, which has recently

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helped some 12 universities for erecting female toilets and conveniences of which Bayero University was among the beneficiaries of the initiative.

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The Vice Chancellor said that apart from the scholarships given by Jufatu, Azman, A.A. Rano, Adamu Muazu, etc. The Students' Union Government had adopted a policy that each student should donate additional 200 naira during registration to cater for the needs of the indigent among them. This session, 6 million naira was generated from such contributions of which 4 million naira was used to sponsor such category of students to continue their studies. ASUU members of Bayero University, he added, had agreed to be contributing to the funds from their monthly salaries.

Professor Bello also disclosed some of his achievements during his two year and some months' stewardship as Vice Chancellor, which included carrying unions, staff and students along for enhanced and harmonious relationships. He explained how at the recently conducted  $52^{nd}$  meeting of Congregation, he accounted for the several achievements he recorded, which include making the meeting to hold two times annually instead of just once a year.

He said both teaching and non-teaching staff had benefitted from sponsorship to conferences, trainings and studies both abroad and at home. This, he said, was ongoing, so far as one fulfilled stipulated criteria. He noted also how the University executed many capital projects and other projects sponsored by individuals, including the Dangote Business School, commissioned recently and the ongoing building of additional female hostel at Old Campus by Alhaji Isyaka Rabi'u.

He said the infrastructural projects both completed and ongoing in the University could make one think that the University hadn't had any financial problem. He disclosed that apart from funds for capital projects from the Federal Government, TETFund and Internally Generated Revenue, assistance from individuals and organizations played critical roles in moving the University forward.

# BUK to Collaborate with United Nations Information Centre on Student Training

Bayero University, Kano is one of the fastest growing citadels of learning in terms of academic exploits and infrastructural transformation, not only in Nigeria, but also in the West African sub-region. This was disclosed by the National Information Officer, United Nations Information Centre (UNIC), Lagos, Dr. Oluseyi Soremekun.

He was speaking during a courtesy call on the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, on Thursday, April  $26^{th} 2018$ . Dr Oluseyi stated that he was overwhelmed by the level of infrastructural development across the university a feat he described as unprecedented.

Dr. Oluseyi said it was because of the pedigree of Bayero University that the Nigerian Office of the United Nations Information Centre, Lagos, decided to seek a mutual beneficial relationship through the Universities' Department of Political Science to establish more training on International Relations as well as to enable the centre to key into the mission and vision of the university.

He listed three key areas where he wanted BUK to collaborate with UNIC. These include UN Academic Impact, which he said was an initiative that allowed universities across the world to interact academically through a coordinated network. He said at the moment there were over 1,000 universities as members with only nine from Nigeria, adding that with the rising profile of Bayero University, Kano, the centre thought that it deserved to be a member of the network.

He said the only requirement was for a prospective member to do a research that was of interest to the United States. Such research, Dr. Oluseyi said, was not By Bala G. Abdullahi

different from the usual researches that would promote development.

Secondly, there is the Model UN, which he said, was similar to the workings of the United Nations, adding that students would learn how decisions were taken at the United Nations, particularly at the meeting of members of United Nation's Security Council. 'It is a learning tool for the students,' he remarked.

Aligned to this, is the Model UN Conference, which is also student-driven and is organized by students under the guidance of their lecturers. It is an annual event and every university will organize its conference on a separate date. According to him, it was self-funding, because delegates across member universities pay to attend, adding that the host university will only provide some logistics. He also revealed that the conference is multi-disciplinary, because, according to him, students from member universities from various departments will be attending.

Dr. Oluseyi explained that, first of all, the students would be trained on the organization of conferences. Thereafter, they will take over the organization of the conference.

The third area of proposal for the collaboration, he said, was the Sustainable Development Goals, which, according to him, was a development frame-work with about 17 goals. He stated that in the area of implementation of the goals, academia is often left out, which, they believed was a major lacuna that needed to be bridged.

Dr. Oluseyi said most often, when it came to monitoring the implementation of the goals, civil society organizations were the only bodies allowed to make noise, saying that 'this time, we want to encourage members of the academia to scrutinize and interrogate the goals with a view to ensuring sustained implementation.' He hoped that the management of Bayero University would be willing to accept the collaboration request of the centre.

Responding, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Muhammad Yahuza Bello, thanked the Centre for choosing Bayero University as one of the institutions in the country for the collaboration. He said BUK would be willing to collaborate with the Centre on all the areas listed above, adding that 'we, in BUK, know the beneficial value of networking. As such, we shall not hesitate to immediately link our university to the network. We are also very much willing to host the Model UN conference.

Professor Aliyu Muhammad Bunza in his lead paper titled: "Folklore and Economic Security in Nigerian" said Folklore was a scientific study of ancient antiquities and its relevance to human socialization and development, which an outsider may perceive as mere entertainment and the preservation of norms and culture. Indeed it was, but it had a deeper significance.

Professor Bunza stated that culture was in-built in us and we cannot do without it. All the human innovation and developments were much related to their cultural background, which motivated all their actions in their struggle to survive and overcome confronting situations and challenges.

Professor Bunza urged that no civilization was possible without the cultural contributions of its in habitants. In the perception of Hausa Society, Folklore was the most relevant antidote in the treatment of any unwanted issue challenging the rightly guided norms in the society. Hausa popular culture, specifically proverbs, tales, song and poetry were the basic drugs for the treatment of social problems and evil practices.

Prof. Bunza dedicated the paper in memory of the late Alhaji Muhammadu Gambo Fagada (Alias Maibarayi) with special reference to his master-piece, "In praise of thieves". The points raised therein were radical whistle blowing in poetic styles, which was unprecedented in the history of Hausa oral songs which concentrated very much on the financial and economic crimes committed by Nigerian civil servants, politicians and others.

# HEALTH SERVICES DEPARTMENT Health Tips on Gastroenteritis!!!

- Gastroenteritis is an inflammation of the linings of the stomach as well as the small and large intestines, which leads to an acute infectious syndrome. It is usually caused by microorganisms, such as viruses, bacteria and parasites secreting toxins that stimulate excessive water and electrolytes loss, thereby causing diarrhoea.
- The signs and symptoms (are generally similar regardless of the microbe causing the infection). They include:

(a) Sudden, Watery diarrhea (b) Vomiting (c) Stomach cramps (d) Nausea (e) Fever (f) Chills (g) Headache

- The disease causing microbes are spread through \*\*
  - The oral-fecal route;
  - Ingesting water or food contaminated with feces,
  - Person-to-person contact, or .
  - Direct exposure to contaminated feces.

#### Behaviors that increase the likelihood of ••• transmission and also increase the risk of

gastroenteritis include:

- Failing to breastfeed your baby (up to 12 months of age to provide the best protection)
- Using a baby bottle to feed your baby (This easily becomes contaminated)
- Storing cooked food at room temperature for

several hours before eating it (This allows the bacteria to multiply).

- Storing drinking water that could have become . contaminated before you drink it
- Drinking water that is contaminated at source
- Not washing your hands properly after using the washroom or before preparing or handling food and not disposing of feces hygienically, particularly baby diapers
- Eating certain higher risk foods, including raw or undercooked meat or poultry, unpasteurized milk or cheese, eggs, fruit and vegetable juices.

#### **Preventing gastroenteritis:** \*\*

- Always wash your hands with soap and water after using the toilet or changing your baby's nappy.
- Always wash your hands before and after preparing or eating food.
- Always wash your hands after touching animals.
- Always wash salad and vegetables thoroughly.
- Avoid close contact with others during your illness.
- Avoid unpasteurized milk, raw meat or raw shellfish.
- Use separate cutting boards and utensils for raw and . cooked meats when preparing meals.
  - Keep your kitchen consistently clean.

Clean toilet seats, flush handles, taps, surfaces and door handles daily with hot water and disinfectants.
