



Eid-el-Fitr: BUK Imam Seeks for Divine Intervention to End Covid-19

The Bayero University, Kano New Campus Imam, Dr. Nuhu Abdullahi Usman has called for the divine intervention to end the dreaded covid-19 pandemic that has ravaged the entire world and reduced places of worships to mere resting shades.

The Imam, in his Sallah sermon on Sunday 26th May, 2020 prayed almighty Allah to intervene in the difficult situation people have found themselves, noting that with prayers things would change for the better. He appealed to the teeming Muslim population to pray fervently, saying that God would answer prayers through persistence and insistence.

He advocated the need for people to continue to observe social distancing, use hand sanitizers and facemask as well as follow other protocols laid down by the health professionals.

The Chief Imam said Muslims have just finished observing 30-day Ramadhan fast in which they totally abstained from eating, drinking and sexual intercourse while observing the fast. He challenged the people to replicate the good deeds during the holy month in the subsequent months so that the society could be better.

“Fear Allah wherever you are and in whatever dealings you do with the follow human beings,” he said.

The Imam urged people to use the teachings of the Ramadhan fast to be good people and abstain from committing bad deeds, saying that if people could embark of committing good deeds, things would change for the better.

Governor Abdullahi Umar Ganduje of Kano State has commended the Professor Yahuza Bello led Kano COVID-19 Fund Raising Committee for what he described as diligent service delivery in the conduct of the distribution of palliative materials.

Speaking on Thursday, 28th May, 2020 at the launch of the second batch of the distribution exercise of the palliatives at KASCO warehouse, Farm Centre, the Governor was particularly delighted at the high level of patriotism and transparency exhibited by the team in discharging its mandate.

“Indeed, we are very much lucky to have people of credibility and integrity in this committee, who are responsible for the distribution of the palliatives. These are people who are honest, dependable and trustworthy. As such we are not entertaining any fear in the distribution system,” said the Governor.

Dr. Ganduje noted that the committee members showed commitment and zeal in carrying out their assignment, which he said was the manifestation of the love they have for the state and humanity in general, which deserves special commendation and applause.

Also speaking, the Chairman of the palliative distribution Committee, Professor Muhammad Yahuza

Bello, said the second phase of the distribution exercise was for the Bichi zone comprises eight local governments.

According to him the exercise was divided into batches and based on geographical zones/emirates of the state for easy distribution. He said the remaining zones of Rano, Gaya and Karaye would get their shares in the subsequent exercise which would be carried out immediately after the completion of the second batch in a couple of days.

In his remarks, the District Head of Tofa, Alhaji Isiyaku Umar Tofa, who spoke on behalf of the Emir, commended the government for the initiatives which he said would go a long way in cushioning the economic hardship faced by the people as a result of the pandemic.

The royal father assured that the traditional institutions would do everything humanly possible to support government in the fight against the pandemic. Some of the efforts already made included mass sensitization and mobilization of the rural populace on the reality of COVID-19 and the need to observe all the medical protocols in fighting it.
