Extension of Registration Period for 2020/2021 Academic Session

he management of Bayero University, Kano has approved further extension of the registration period for both returning and fresh students for the 2020/2021 academic session.

A statement signed by the Director of Directorate of Examinations, Admissions and Records (DEAR), Amina Umar Abdullahi, said the registration period for returning students was extended to 17th October, 2021 while that of fresh students would be closed on 31st October, 2021.

"This is to convey the Vice Chancellor's approval for extension of registration period for all students (fresh and returning) for the 2020/2021 academic session. Returning students are expected to finish their registration on or before 17th October, 2021, while fresh students have up to 31st October, 2021 to finish registration," said the statement.

However, late registration attracts five thousand surcharges. "Students who fail to register within the stipulated period will have to pay the sum of five thousand (N5, 000) being penalty for the late registration," it added.

CDA Moves to Revive Groundnut Production in Nigeria

The Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA) has under the AVISA Project. moved to revive the production of groundnut in Nigeria to reclaim its status as one of the viable agricultural commercial products with the aim of increasing the gross domestic product.

Several factors have been identified as the bane of the rapid decline in groundnut production in Nigeria, such as drought, rosette virus, the general neglect of agriculture due to oil the boom and lack of organized input. However, the CDA in collaboration with ICRISAT and IITA took this challenge to revive the production by providing new improved seeds to farmers for sustainable production

During the Farmers' Field Day organized by the CDA on Wednesday, 6th October, 2021, farmers from 22 adopted communities of CDA were exposed to different variety of seeds in order to look at the suitability or otherwise, so that they appreciate the research effort being made.

The Director of CDA, Professor Jibrin Mohammed Jibrin, in his welcome remarks, said the programme was important to researchers in order to know what farmers need and their preference. He noted that it was important for them to look at the preferred seeds that would adapt to climate change variability.



The Principal Investigator of the Project, Professor Sanusi Gaya Mohammed, in his remarks, said at the level of research, they used to screen the seeds and come up with those that would be given to seed companies to multiply their production, which farmers used.

Professor Mohammed, who is the Deputy Director, Training of CDA, said apart from groundnut seeds the CDA had been supporting the farmers with cowpea, beans and surghum seeds that really improved their yields.

On her part, the Deputy Director, Outreach and Publications, Professor Amina Mustapha, said AVISA Project was one of the outreach programmes of the centre, as it has collaboration with many partners in Nigeria and the world.

Prof Mustapha said that the CDA had been engaging its 22 adopted companies with modern agricultural farming methods and empowerment of improved seeds, as well as skills and training that improved their production and

expanded their awareness. She said the centre would continue to give emphasis to its outreach activities.

The Country Director of ICRISAT, Dr. Hakeem Ajeigbe, urged the farmers to look critically at the seeds in order to give their feedback to the researchers. He said it would really help research activities.

Also speaking, Professor M. Yeye of Institute of Agricultural Research, ABU Zaria, said the AVISA Project aimed to improve the research activities through the use of various tools and application to enhance the process. It also aimed to provide the seeds to farmers and educate them on use and application in order to improve yields.

Others who spoke were Professor Daniel Aba of IAR, Dr. Abou Togola and Ado Garba from KNARDA.

Farmers interviewed expressed appreciation to the CDA and its partners for helping with the improved seeds. They expressed optimism that other farmers would adopt the use of the seeds so that the production of groundnut and other crops would be on higher scale in Nigeria.

BUK Hosts Training Workshop on Tannery Waste Management

Academy of Engineering and GB Tannery organized a publications were produced on Kano Tannery Industry, training workshop on Tannery Waste Management under the Higher Education Partnership in Sub-Saharan Africa (HEPSSA) 2021.

The capacity building workshop brought together members of academia, industry and students who discussed extensively on how best to manage the waste product released from the tannery industry and turn the waste into wealth.

The Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, who was represented by the Director Directorate of Research, Innovation and Partnership, Professor I. A. Rufai, said Bayero University had a vision of attaining excellence by developing the capacity of its staff and students to address the developmental challenges in Africa through cutting edge research. He said by the time practical challenges of academia and industry were attended to, fundamental development crisis in Africa would be addressed.

According to him, it was believed that the quality of graduates in the Nigerian universities had left much to be desired, saying that such capacity building workshop would play a critical role in addressing the problem by bridging the gap between academia and industry.

Dr. Munir I. Kamba of the Department of Library and Information Sciences, in his presentation on Fundamentals of Academic and Applied Research, said Nigeria could not compete with other African countries, such as South Africa, Kenya, Botswana, Rwanda and Ghana, due to inadequate support for research, lack of sufficient funds, insecurity, poverty and basic social amenities.

He called on all the stakeholders, such as government, research centres and agencies to as a matter of priority address the challenges. He said academia and industries should have complimentary partnership.

Dr. Aliyu Baba Barau, who spoke on Application of Applied Research in Waste Management expressed

Bayero University, Kano in collaboration with Royal dismay that from 1963 to date only 52 well researched saying that it was really a cause for much concern.

> He said Nigeria was the highest producer of tannery products in Africa with the potential of generating \$1b annually, but had neglected the research on the industry.

> Dr. Barau advocated the need for serious research and investment in order to turn around the economic fortune and make it as one of the competitors for generating substantial GDP and employing labour to address the



challenges of poverty.

Furthermore, Dr. Barau was of the opinion that if the investors and policy makers were hiding under the guise of lack of power as the factor that caused the collapse of the industry, the use of solar energy would solve the problem.

The Project Leader, in his welcome remarks Prof. I. A. Rufa'i earlier, said the essence of the workshop was to address the gap between what was taught in academia and what is needed in the industry, saying that looking at the practical realities, the two institutions were not working in tandem.

The capacity building workshop took place between 2nd and 3rd October, 2021 at Mambayya House.

VC Charges FEES to Monitor Level of Radon Gas Across the University By Fausat Opayemi

Professor Suleiman Abdullahi Arabi in his presentation, titled "Gauging our familiarity with other **Environmental issues: A Case of Radioactive Gas That** Defies all the Sense Organs" said Uranium and thorium which are important sources of Radionuclides Radon, were found in rocks and soils, which served as the main building material used in most part of the world.

Professor Suleiman Abdullahi Arabi made this disclosure during his presentation at the Talking Environment Seminar Series on Tuesday 28th September, 2021 at the Faculty of Earths and Environmental Sciences.

He said radon being a radioactive gas could escape from soils and building materials where they were formed.

The Dean, Faculty of Earth and Environmental Sciences (FEES), Professor Ibrahim Baba Yakubu, in his remarks

thanked the University Management for continually supporting the faculty's monthly seminar series, which according to him was meant to promote and deepen intellectualism across the faculty. He said Professor Arabi's presentation was apt and squarely addressesed the Faculty's reinvigorated goal of broadening environmental discourse.

According to him, Radon from the soil being a radioactive gas, could escape from soils and building materials where they were formed through cracks in buildings, foundations, floor and walls. He said that if the building was not well ventilated, the gas could concentrate in the lower floors where it was breathed in by occupants.

According to him, studies by the United States Environmental Protection Agency showed that lung cancer caused by Radon inhalation was ranked third among other mortality for selected cancers, such as leukemia, lymphoma and liver, among others. He said it also ranked the highest cause of death among some causes of drunk driving, drowning falls and fire in homes.

Professor Arabi said Radon could be prevented in our homes and offices by using selected materials, installation of Radon detection devices, which could alert home owners to take necessary action.

Earlier, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, who was represented by the DVC, Management Services, Professor Mahmoud Umar Sani, in his opening remarks, disclosed that the university had set up research funds for academics to conduct short term researches with a view to solving immediate problems and other emerging issues like Radon gas pollution that could affect the health and wellbeing of members of the University community.

The Vice Chancellor, Professor Abbas, while appreciating the presenter, Professor Arabi for his well-articulated presentation, called on DRIP to establish a database of ongoing researches in the University so as to enable
