Religious Harmony Is Key to Nigeria's Peace and Prosperity, Says Former Archbishop of Canterbury Justin Welby

Former Archbishop of Canterbury, Rt. Rev. & Rt. Hon. Justin Welby, GCVO, has called for deepened inter-ethnic and inter-religious harmony as the surest foundation for Nigeria's peace, stability and sustainable development.

Welby made the call on Thursday, 29 January 2026, while delivering the 45th Pre-Convocation Public Lecture of Ahmadu Bello University, Zaria, at the Abdullahi Mahadi Lecture Hall. His lecture was titled *"Building Inter-Ethnic and Religious Harmony in Nigeria: Pathways to National Unity."*

Addressing a distinguished audience of academics, religious leaders, policymakers and students, the former

Anglican primate described Nigeria as a nation of immense promise whose progress depends largely on how it manages its diversity.

Drawing from a personal relationship with Nigeria that dates back to 1978, Welby said his repeated visits had only deepened his respect for the country's cultural richness and complexity. He cautioned against simplistic judgments about the nation, remarking that anyone who claims to fully understand Nigeria is only deceiving themselves.

"Nigeria is complicated," he said. "Whenever you think you have reached a conclusion about this country, the final sentence must always be, 'But Nigeria is not as simple as that.'"

Welby argued that political peace in Nigeria cannot endure without religious peace, stressing that justice in society is difficult to sustain without moral teaching. According to him, religion, when rightly understood, should serve as a moral anchor and a bridge between communities, rather than a tool for division.

He rejected the notion that strict secularism offers solutions to Nigeria's social and security challenges, noting that faith remains central to the lives of most Nigerians. In his view, stripping society of its religious core risks eroding the values of trust, compassion and responsibility that hold communities together.

The cleric challenged religious leaders across faiths to develop practical strategies that promote tolerance and peaceful coexistence, enabling Nigerians of different beliefs and backgrounds to live together with dignity and mutual respect.

Speaking on insecurity and inter-religious relations, Welby acknowledged that Nigeria faces both progress and persistent problems. He emphasized that both Islam and Christianity reject violence and the persecution of innocents, including attacks on places of worship, insisting that religion must always be a force for reconciliation.

“Faith should heal wounds, not deepen them,” he said, adding that peace built on justice and truth creates the conditions for economic growth and national prosperity.

Welby also touched on wider global challenges

confronting Nigeria and the world, including climate change, corruption, terrorism, misinformation, economic instability and geopolitical rivalry. He urged Nigeria, as a leading regional power, to provide principled leadership rooted in justice, cooperation and concern for the vulnerable.

He called on government and other stakeholders to pay special attention to the poor and marginalized, warning that societies that neglect their weakest members undermine their own future.

The lecture was chaired by the Pro-Chancellor and Chairman of the Ahmadu Bello University Governing Council, Alhaji Mahmud Yayale Ahmed, who represented former President Olusegun Obasanjo, the Chairman of the occasion. In his remarks, Ahmed said religion should be Nigeria's strength rather than a source of division, noting that faith has the capacity to unite communities and inspire national renewal.

Also present was the Vice-Chancellor of Bayero University, Kano, Professor Haruna Musa, fsi, who represented the Minister of Education, Dr Tunji Alausa.

The event drew praise from participants who described the lecture as timely, thoughtful and relevant to Nigeria's current challenges, especially at a period marked by social tensions and ideological influences from outside the country.

BUK, Chartered Institute of Bankers of Nigeria Sign Linkage Agreement ...Introduces B.Sc./ACIB Qualifications

Bayero University, Kano (BUK) and the Chartered Institute of Bankers of Nigeria (CIBN) signed a linkage agreement to integrate professional banking qualifications

(the Associate of the Chartered Institute of Bankers, ACIB) into the university's academic offerings in banking and related fields.

The programme is part of CIBN's B.Sc./ACIB Linkage Programme, which allows eligible students to earn their

academic degree (B.Sc.) and the professional ACIB qualification more efficiently, the partnership is to deepen ties between academic training and professional practice.

Speaking during the signing of the agreement on Tuesday, 27th January, 2026, the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Haruna Musa, fsi, described the linkage agreement as central to the university's strategic direction and consistent with the “triple helix” model (industry, academia and policymakers) collaborating to drive knowledge exchange, commercialisation and national development.

The signing ceremony which took place in Lagos at the headquarters of the Institute was performed by the Vice Chancellor, Professor Haruna Musa on behalf of the University, while the Institute was represented by the CIBN President and Chairman of Council, Professor Pius Deji Olanrewaju.

The partnership would grant significant examination exemptions for BUK graduates. Under the arrangement, B.Sc. Finance students would be required to sit only four modules of the Chartered Institute of Bankers' examinations to qualify for the Associateship of the Institute. Eligible undergraduates in finance and related management sciences would be able to earn their academic degrees alongside the ACIB professional qualification.

It should be noted that at the postgraduate level, the partnership enabled Master's in Finance (MFIN) students to graduate with both an MFIN degree and the ACIB associateship.

Earlier, the CIBN President and Chairman of Council, Professor Pius Deji Olanrewaju, had said the partnership would strengthen “town-and-gown” relations and improve graduate employability, particularly in the North-West. He added that allowing students to begin professional examinations while still in school would reduce the time

and cost of transitioning into professional practice and urged both institutions to establish a linkage committee promptly to ensure effective implementation and measurable outcomes.

The Vice-Chancellor was accompanied by Dr. Nuruddeen Abba Abdullahi, Head of the Department of Finance, where the linkage agreement is domiciled. The agreement also provides opportunities for faculty development through joint conferences, research, publications and participation in CIBN professional activities.

College of Health Sciences Hosts Workshop on Constructive Alignment to Enhance Medical Training

The College of Health Sciences, Bayero University, Kano, took a significant step towards advancing its pedagogical standards by hosting a one-day workshop on Constructive Alignment for 50 of its academic staff on January, 29th 2026.

The event, themed "Connecting The What; with the How: Constructive Alignment in Health Professions Education (HPE)," was designed to equip academic staff with best practices to improve teaching quality and student learning outcomes.

In his opening remarks, the Provost of the College of Health Sciences, Professor Idris Mohammed Yahaya, described the workshop as exceptionally timely. He noted that many academic staff, despite their subject matter expertise, might not have foundational training in teaching methodologies. "This workshop provides a veritable platform to remind our academic staff of what they are supposed to do in line with best teaching practices," Professor Yahaya stated, emphasizing the institution's commitment to educational excellence.

The session was led by a distinguished expert, Professor Ibrahim Inuwa, a Professor of Anatomy Education with

over 30 years of experience as a medical educator in the UK, Africa and the Middle East. Professor Inuwa, who is the former Associate Dean for Education at Mohammed Bin Rashid University of Medicine and Health Sciences in Dubai, brought a wealth of global experience to the discussion.

Professor Inuwa advocated for the adoption of Constructive Alignment, a curriculum design framework that ensured a direct link between learning outcomes, teaching methods and assessments. He advised that a common flaw in traditional education is the misalignment between these elements, which could lead to superficial learning. He urged the participants to create a more transparent and purposeful learning journey for their students.

"We must move away from a system where students are left to guess what is truly important," Professor Inuwa explained. He advocated the need for an intentional design where every educational activity is geared toward achieving clearly defined competencies.

Professor Inuwa positioned constructive alignment as a critical enabler of Competency-Based Medical Education (CBME), a model that prioritized the holistic development of graduates. He advised that by focusing on the integration of knowledge, skills and professional attitudes, educators could ensure their students were fully prepared for the multifaceted responsibilities of patient care.

In his closing remarks, Professor Inuwa reiterated his central message. He advocated the need for a paradigm shift in educational philosophy, from one focused on content delivery to one centered on intentional design and student competency. He concluded by saying that by embracing constructive alignment, the College of Health Sciences at Bayero University could lead the way in producing a new generation of healthcare professionals equipped to meet the evolving needs of society.

Azman University Visits BUK to Strengthen Ties, Foster Academic Mentorship

Bulletin shortly after handing over to the newly elected SUG executives at the Convocation Arena on Wednesday, January, 28th 2026. He expressed gratitude to the Chairman and members of the Bayero University Kano Independent Electoral Commission (BUKIECO) for ensuring a free, fair and credible electoral process, a development he said was widely acknowledged by the university community.

Beyond the successful conduct of the election, the CTC Chairman noted that his administration conceived and

initiated four key student-focused projects across the University's campuses. Two of the projects are located at the new site, while the remaining two are at the old campus. These include the solarization of the kitchen conversion environment, the initiation of a bus stop at the new site main gate, the proposed Students' Recreation Centre at the Old Campus and a Students' Reading Centre at the Faculty of Life Sciences.

Speaking on the challenges encountered during his tenure, Senator Giwa identified time constraint as his greatest hurdle. According to him, the responsibility of leading the Caretaker Committee came with enormous demands and expectations.

“Being the CTC Chairman marked another phase of my life because it came with a lot of challenges. I am someone who believes strongly in leaving a legacy and I had numerous ideas aimed at improving students' welfare. However, the limited time available made it difficult to fully implement all these ideas, though we did our best,” he said.

He further explained that leadership entailed more than the acquisition of power, describing it as a sacrifice and a call to serve. He added that engaging corporate organizations to support student projects as part of their corporate social responsibility required significant personal commitment and often meant sacrificing personal and academic activities.

“Balancing my academic responsibilities with leadership duties was quite challenging. Nevertheless, with the support of my executive members, the Deanery of Student Affairs and the University Management, we were able to record meaningful successes, Alhamdulillah,” Senator Giwa added.

DRIP to hold Maiden National Conference, Exhibition on Research and Development

Prof. Arabi told the Vice-Chancellor that the visit was to brief him on the level of preparedness of the planned National Conference coming up in June, 2026. He thanked the Vice-Chancellor for his kind and enormous support towards the hosting of the Conference.

In his remarks, the Chairman of Local Organizing Committee (LOC) and the Deputy Director (Research and Development), Prof. M. M. Maina, revealed that Committee had gone far in its preparation for the Conference, including; holding several meetings, developing conference fliers, banners, posters and distribution of letters to fundable donors.

He solicited the assistance of the University Management

to approve the use of the proposed and newly commissioned International Conference Centre (ICC) for the Conference.

He thanked the Management for donating one-million naira (N1,000,000.00) to the Committee to kick start its activities.

In his response, the Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Haruna Musa, expressed appreciation to the Committee for the update and applauded DRIP for this laudable initiative, noting that the planned conference would showcase the University's research output to the public with view to attracting industrialization of research and in line with the University's quest for commercialization of research.

Prof. Musa also appreciated the level of preparedness of the LOC on the Conference and encouraged the Committee to ensure regular follow-ups, especially to the funding donors, for the smooth conduct of the conference.

On the use of ICC facilities, the VC advised the Committee to look for an alternative venue as the facility was not fully operational, because some important facilities were not put in place by the contractor including installation of multimedia, water and power supply as well as the upgrade of the 38 accommodation rooms to meet ICC standards, among others.

He traced the history of the ICC facility which he said started as constituency capital project by Senator Bello Hayatu Gwarzo and later due to paucity of fund, the project stopped. Later, TETFund took over the facility.

He promised that the facility would soon be put to use, saying that the University had fully engaged the Contractor and that work on edifice would be completed in line with the sustainability initiative of the federal government universities.

Prof. Musa prayed for the success of the Conference which he believed would go a long way to showcase research productivity and at the same vein, assist the researchers towards realizing their research objectives.

CALL FOR MEMORANDUM ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON COLLEGIATE SYSTEM IN BAYERO UNIVERSITY, KANO

1. Background

The University is in the process of reviewing the structure, operations, and future development of its Collegiate System, with a view to strengthening governance, improving efficiency, and ensuring sustainable growth. In this regard, the Senate has constituted an Advisory Committee on Collegiate System to provide expert guidance and evidence-based recommendations that will inform policy decisions and strategic planning with the following.

Terms of Reference:

- i) Trace the historical evolution of the Collegiate System in the University.
- ii) Review the functions and operational guidelines of Colleges, particularly the relationships between a College and its constituent units, as well as with the statutory organs of the University.
- iii) Advise on the optimal number of Colleges the University should have, taking into account financial and human resource requirements, as well as space and physical infrastructure needs.
- iv) Advise on the process of establishing a College, including required approvals by statutory bodies and relevant regulatory agencies.
- v) Develop a ten-year roadmap for the establishment of additional Colleges, considering the requirements outlined in (iii) above.
- vi) Advise University Management on strategies for ensuring the smooth and effective takeoff of Colleges.
- vii) Make any other recommendations incidental to items (i) to (v) above.

2. Aim and Objectives of Collegiate System

The aim of the Collegiate system is for the University to adopt modern system of decentralising its administrative structure for administrative efficiency, academic excellence and quality assurance.

The objectives are:

- a) Elimination of bureaucratic bottlenecks
- b) Overcoming delays in implementation of University policies and decisions
- c) Enhancing efficient and effective management of academic units
- d) Ease of access to records and information on staff, students and college activities
- e) Enhancing professionalism in administrative and support services

3. Call for Memoranda

The Committee warmly invites members of the University community to submit memoranda to the Advisory Committee on Collegiate System in Bayero University, Kano.

Contributors are encouraged to share constructive views, practical experiences, and forward-looking suggestions that will assist the Committee in formulating balanced and context-sensitive recommendations.

Submissions should be analytical, concise, and supported with relevant data, institutional experience, and best practices where applicable.

4. Submission Guidelines

Memoranda should be clearly structured, typed, and submitted in both hard and electronic copies where applicable. All submissions should clearly indicate the author(s) name(s) and institutional affiliation.
