Faculty of Agric Hosts 9th CSN's National Conference By Nura Garba

The Faculty of Agriculture hosted the 9th National would significantly help address the challenges faced by Conference of Crop Science Society of Nigeria (CSSN) on Monday, October 14, 2024 with the theme: "Transforming Crop Production in Face of Insecurity and Economic Crisis: Challenges and Opportunities.

In his address, the Vice Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas said conference of this nature provided a unique platform for the participants to share knowledge, ideas and experiences on the latest developments in crop Science, with the ultimate goal of improving good security, nutrition and sustainable agricultural practices in Nigeria.

He said the theme reflected our commitment to addressing the complex issues affecting crop production, processing and marketing in Nigeria. He, therefore, expressed his gratitude to the presenters, participants and organizers for their contribution to the conference.

The Minister of Agriculture and Food Security, Senator Abubakar Kyari, affirmed that the federal government is implementing decisive measures to mitigate the impacts of climate change and food insecurity, both of which have been persistent issues of concern in the country.

Represented by the Director Federal Department of Agriculture, Engineer Abubakar Garba, said that these efforts

Nigeria's agricultural sector. He noted that the government has established an effective early warning system to predict and prepare for climate-related disasters, among other strategies.

Earlier in a welcome address, he Dean, Faculty of Agriculture, Professor M. A. Hussain gave a brief history of the faculty in which he said was established in August 2001 which started with 3 departments but has metarmophosed now with 8 departments.

He further revealed that the University management out of its objectives for higher level training established the Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA) in 2012 to produce highly skilled manpower and research products that will address the challenges of agricultural development, especially within the West and Central African dryland areas.

The President of the Crop Science Society of Nigeria, Professor M. I. Uhuru lamented that the current global food crisis has hit our country hard and that food prices have soared as many communities are facing acute food shortages. He said there are discernible signs of starvation and malnutrition in Nigeria. He advocated the need to increase crop and animal production at both local and national levels, adding that the

conference was organized by the Crop Science Society of their production prospects in Nigeria. He called for active Nigeria (CSSN) to reverse the trend of the new agricultural technologies through research efforts tailored towards crop yield improvements.

In a Keynote address, the Vice Chancellor of Capital City University, Prof. Yusuf B. Daraja titled "Innovative Agricultural Practices for Resilience Building in Nigeria's Economy and Security Landscape," affirmed that agriculture reduces unemployment, alleviates poverty and supports Nigeria's broader development goals. He said by modernizing farming techniques, expanding value chains and embracing sustainability, the country can fully harness its agricultural potentials for a prosperous future.

Prof. Daraja also urged the farmers to adopt innovative practices which include climate-smart agricultural techniques, diversifying crops, engaging in value addition and participating in farmer organizations or cooperative to access shared resources and knowledge and to also utilize digital platforms for accessing market information, weather updates and extension services so as to make informed decisions and improve efficiency.

The Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA) marked the provoking points and provided the environmental impacts World Food Day with a Symposium on Wednesday, October 16th, 2024 at the Centre's Conference Hall, Bayero University, Kano, New Site.

The Symposium which had its theme as "Right to Food for a Better Life and Future" featured several paper presentations that served as indicators and parameters contributing to food security as deducted from the theme.

The speakers who consisted of experts and academicians in the agriculture industry respectively presented.

In a remarks, Director of the Centre For Dryland Agriculture (CDA), Prof Jibrin Mohammad Jibrin emphasized that the theme of the program spotlighted the importance of food diversity, nutrition, affordability, accessibility and sustainability. He contributed a great deal to some of the topics delivered by the presenters as the Host and moderator of the event. He later suggested a big and open dialogue session where important experts and stakeholders will be engaged in order to discuss the challenges and prospects of agriculture on a wider scale by aiming to explore and implement the productive agricultural practices.

Meanwhile, Yemi Akinbamijo, PHD, Former Executive Director, Forum for Agricultural Research (FARA) had earlier enlightened the audience through a Zoom Conference Call on "Food Security as an Outcome of Rural Productivity" in which he stressed some thought Vol. XLIII No. 81 - Bulletin Friday, 18th October, 2024

of food and agriculture and clamored for the power of collaboration, increased application of science, technology and innovation, serious attention to labor productivity and biotechnology.

Also speaking through virtual call, Mr Ayodele Balogun contributed to the subject of presentation as he affirmed that the rural population is 46% of the total population through the graphical slides he projected and then highlighted the effect of government's ignorance of food production and sustainability leading to inflation and recommended that policy should support investment to improve rural productivity.

Adnan Aminu Adnan, PHD, Faculty of Agriculture, Bayero University, Kano further delivered "Forecasting Production, Demand, Consumption of Priority Value Chains in Nigeria (2023 - 2030): Agri-Inputs and GAPs as Pivots of Growth" which had him established Forecasting as being crucial to policy making through his pictorial presentation and maintained that improvement of major commodities must put regions into consideration, quality forecasting for desired results, GAPs and financing especially for agri-inputs and business is essential to reach deficit production, maize requires large investment in land while others attract little and investment in GAPs and financing could meet all priority commodities by 2030 except for maize.

Professor Aminu Suleiman outlined the benefits of forecasting in policy making and implementation to agricultural development, its use in planning even distribution of agricultural commodities and. He stressed the practicalities of food forecasting models however opined that they could sometimes be unable to predict economic and environmental outcomes. Therefore, he called for robust models and methodologies and accurate data and collaboration among the states for accurate forecasting that represent zone as well.

Prof Abubakar Jimmei, University of Maiduguri, who spoke virtually, urged the CDA to collaborate with local, national and international organizations on insecurity, climate change and environmental factors as it'll improve food production, empower farmers and boost the nation's economy. Recall that an interactive session happened at intervals throughout the program.


Munzali, who worked at CBN for 10 years, said that he was able to discover himself, build confidence and also express himself as a member of CFA.
