

1st International Conference on Renewable Energy: Fossil Energy Resources Contribute to Environmental DegradationSays Experts

The constant use of fossil energy resources which emit significant quantities of carbon dioxide has been raising global temperature thereby adversely affecting the environment, a renowned expert in renewable energy, emeritus Professor Abubakar Sani Sambo, has said.

Presenting a keynote paper at the 1st International Conference hosted by the Bayero University, Kano's Centre for Renewable Energy and Sustainable Transition on Wednesday, 16th October, 2024, he noted that "The rise in temperature leads to climate change which will disrupt the agricultural situation. Rainfall will not come as we know it and therefore affects food production.".

Professor Sambo, who is the President -elect of Nigerian Academy of Science (NAS) advocated for use of electric vehicles and other components of renewable and alternative energy to achieve even development in the country.

The paper titled "Alternative Energy Sources of Sustainable Development in Nigeria" explained the urgent

he constant use of fossil energy resources which need for political will and determination to take action on utilizing the renewable energies the country is abundantly been raising global temperature thereby adversely blessed with.

"Countries set clear goals for megawatt production, identified sources to supply the megawatts, and provided the conducive environment for investors to move in the desired direction, guiding them to achieve the desired outcomes.

According to him even smaller countries like Ghana, cape Verde, Kenya, Rwanda, Cote d'Ivoire and Senegal whose government have enhanced political will in electricity sector have expanded to greater electricity access.

The Professor of Nuclear Science, who teaches at the Faculty of Engineering and Environmental Design at Usmanu Danfofiyo University, Sokoto, further explained that fossil energy resources such as coal, oil and natural gas which have been the dominant sources of energy for electrification, transportation and industrial production in the country are highly polluting and exhaustible with CO2

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change which affects agriculture and food security.

The former Vice Chancellor of Abubakar Tafawa Balewa University (ATBU), Bauchi, added that there is need for investing and harnessing renewable energy sources like solar, wind, hydro, geothermal, biomass among others with a negligible greenhouse gases, noting that, it can boost energy supply, provide job opportunities and also create a sustainable environment.

Professor Sani Sambo, a onetime Director General of the Nigerian Energy Commission, however tasked the federal government and other stakeholders on making realistic targets and providing the enabling environment for renewable energy to thrive.

In his virtual presentation, Prof. Kevin Nwaigwe, of Clean Energy Research Center, (CERC), University of Botswana stated that the goal of energy access is to provide environmentally sustainable, safe, reliable, and affordable energy for all. "Universal energy access and the elimination of energy poverty are urgently needed for the growing world population," he said

He explained that about 13% of the world's population (approximately 940 million people) does not have access to electricity, adding that about 40% of the world (approximately 3 billion people) does not have access to environmentally sustainable fuel for cooking.

"In sub-Saharan Africa, only 82 per cent of people have access to any form of electricity leaving about 18 per cent of the population without access to electricity (UN, 2021). According to him, about 85 per cent of those lacking access to electricity globally reside in rural areas with sub-Saharan Africa accounting for 75 per cent of this population.

Earlier in his remark, the Vice Chancellor Prof. Sagir Adamu-Abbas, commended the Centre for organizing the alternative to fossil fuels among others," he said

Crop Scientists Seek Role for their Members By Nura Garba

Crop Science Society of Nigeria (CSSN) members have representing universities, research institutes, polytechnics, urged government, at the federal, state and local levels, to engage services to their members with a view to overcoming the problem of food insecurity in the country.

A communiqué issued at the end of the 9th National Conference and Annual General Meeting, held at Bayero University, Kano (BUK) with the theme: "Transforming Crop Production in the Face of Insecurity and Economic Crisis: Challenges and Opportunities."

The conference recommended "adoption of advances in biotechnology, effective government policies such as access to credit, agricultural extension services, functional partnerships and social safety nets that provide farmers with resources, education and infrastructure" in tackling the current food security challenge in Nigeria.

In their talks on innovative solutions in crop science, the speakers observed that global food crisis is hitting the country hard and food prices are soaring due to food shortage, because of the nation's reliance on oil driven economy.

"It has become imperative for the three tiers of government to holistically engage crop scientists in the sustainable production of safe and affordable food for improved human health, export market and economic prosperity of Nigeria.

Nigeria's path to progress requires economic diversification, good governance, and tackling security crisis hindering farmer's productivity through the deployment of superior weaponry, dialogue and economic measures," a communique at the end of the conference said.

The meeting had in attendance government officials, members of Agriculture and Allied agencies and farmers' associations, representatives of Agro-allied Industries, NGOs, Extension and Advisory Services, many university VCs, deans and students.

There were 130 major participants across Nigeria and other African countries, from 20 institutions across the nation

Colleges of Agriculture, industries and private and government agencies.

"Agriculture, which employs most Nigerians, remains underdeveloped, with small-scale farmers relying on outdated techniques without high-quality seeds resulting to poor output.



"The country is beset by Boko Haram insurgency in the northeast, armed banditry in the Northwest and North Central regions, and herders-farmers conflicts across the country, thus exacerbating economic challenges, displacing people especially farmers, disrupting agricultural production, and deterring investment," the meeting further observed.

According to the communiqué, climate change is disrupting traditional farming practices, while lack of infrastructure, training, and financial support, coupled with poor adoption of modern agricultural technologies are other challenges.

"A substantial portion of agricultural produce is being lost due to inadequate storage, poor processing facilities, and inefficient transportation systems resulting in a loss of 40

percent of food produced during post-harvest, contributing "Development of specialised training centers in rural areas to food insecurity and reducing farmers' income," Minister that focus on modern agricultural practices and postof Agriculture and Food Security, Sen. Abubakar Kyari, represented by Engr Abdullahi Abubakar, said.

The conference recommended: "the development and dissemination of improved seed varieties that promote agricultural diversification.

The Bayero University Staff Model Secondary School was inaugurated on Monday 7th October, 2024 with a mandate to elevate the school's standing to compete with leading secondary schools in Kano metropolis. The Chairman, Professor Ali Idris disclosed his goal during the inauguration.

Professor Idris said part of strategies to uplift the school was the formation of four sub-committees that consist of Technical and Academic Committee, Recruitment and Upgrading Committee, Staff and Students' Disciplinary Committee as well as Finance and General Purpose Committee.

The Chairman said the Vice-Chancellor, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas had carefully selected members of the School's Board whom he believes can move the school forward. He urged the members to do the needful in order to achieve the desired goal, adding that changes had started manifesting with the effort of the School Management and that of the Board's Chairman, appointed in October 2022.

He listed some achievements recorded in the School to include the purchase of laboratory equipment upgrade of computer laboratory with 6 additional computers, networking and installation of software for analysis of results, fixing of valves in the school's walls to strengthen security, repair of roofing, installation of solar powered system, conversion of the school's hand pump to motorized system, improvement of the school's sickbay with additional bed, purchase of sports facilities and upward adjustment of staff salaries.

The School's Principal, Alhaji Tijjani M. Adamu who traced the history of the School to early 1980's said the present enrolment of students in the school was 706. He commended the efforts of the Board's Chairman for the solarizing 20 classes with light in the school, laboratories, administrative block and surrounding security light.

The Principal said, staff of the school were given 15 percent of their salaries as palliatives during Eid-El-Kabir and Eid-El-Fitr and that the PTA renovated the girls' toilets. He added that in 2023/2024 academic session the school hosted competitions and winning clubs were presented with prizes. In the 2nd term, the school held indoor games while in the 3rd term, students were engaged in debating competition and winners were presented with prizes. The school he added among eleven schools secured 5th position in junior entrepreneurship competition.

He expressed delight that in 2022/2023 academic session the school recorded 92.7 percent success on WASSCE, 99.81 percent on NECO and 86. 86 percent on BECE, adding that during 2023/2024 session the school recorded 95 percent success on WAEC and 96 percent on NECO.

Dr. Safiya Ahmad Nuhu in her opening remarks said the CGS was established in 2015 to carry out research, training and project on issues that cut across gender, she said the center conducts research based initiatives surrounding gender issues and take cognizance of vulnerable people, women, children, persons with disability, internally displaced persons among others.

She said CGS articulated area of interest is inclusive development and was happy to collaborate with Arewa



Arthritic Patients Association (AAPAN) of Nigeria and also invite key stake holders to commemorate the day.

She said arthritis is a serious ailment and sometime life threatening and not many people know about the ailment due to inadequate support, strategies and advocacy in the care of the ailment.

The Chairman of the discussion, Prof. Doctor, Ibrahim Alhaji Daiyyabu, a renowned Consultant Rheumatologist in Northern Nigeria said as a young Residence Doctor in 2003 mentored by Prof. Musa Borrodo who was his Head of Department then, attended a lecture delivered by the only Rheumatologist in Nigeria at that time in the person of Prof. Olufemi Adelowo, to medical students and residence doctor and in the cause of the lecture he discovered there was lack of manpower to cater for people with arthritis and as result decided to fill the gap by studying a sub specialty which is Rheumatology.

He said today Nigeria has over 40 trained Rheumatologist in the country and that Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital (AKTH) has one of the highest numbers of trained Rheumatologist in the country.

be caused by trauma or even microorganism that find its way into the body system. He said there are several cases of arthritis and children are not spared, disclosing that the only Pediatric Rheumatologist in Nigeria is in Lagos State Teaching Hospital and he is looking forward to seeing the gap being filled.

He advised that when joint are swollen and painful the patient should go to the nearest hospital for diagnoses and remedy, and contrary to popular believe, exposure to cold is not the cause of arthritis but only aggravate the symptom said Dr. Daiyabu

He said there is need for advocacy by collaborating with care givers, patient associations group on societal misconception about arthritis

There are paucity of manpower according to Doctor Daiyabu that takes care of people with arthritis because there are other stakeholder apart from rheumatologist such as orthopedic surgeons and Physiotherapists that add values to taking care of patients with arthritis.

According to him, finance in taking care of arthritic patient is enormous because essential drug list does not include the ones for arthritic patients and majority of the drugs are not covered by NHIA causing problem from getting drug out of pocket.

He said health insurance coverage for arthritic patient is abysmal and there is need for strategic planning that can help mitigate problems in arthritic care and that the condition can also impair functions, cause low productivity and absenteeism from work.

Arthritis according to Dr Daiyabu can be prevented through healthy living, exercise, eating of balanced diet, proper use of foot wear among others.

Dr. Yakubu Abubakar, a discussant and a Physiotherapist from Aminu Kano Teaching Hospital (AKTH) said, physiotherapy is an integral part of arthritis care and that the challenge is information concerning arthritis. He said there is need to keep educating patients about the condition and how to manage it, patients according to him should be advised that care of arthritis is multidisciplinary approach and should be refer to other professionals.

He advised arthritic patients on early intervention and care because if detected early it can be cured and those that cannot be cured can be well managed.

Dr. Daiyyabu said living with arthritis is not synonymous to being disabled, but some of those that come late for help end up being deformed.

He said lots of people do not know about the existence of Rheumatologist who are trained to care for patient with arthritis, he therefore advised association like Arewa Arthritic Patient Association of Nigeria to do the advocacy of the presence and existence of Rheumatologists.Prof.
