Bayero University, Kano (BUK) has recorded a This remarkable success underscored the faculty's strong remarkable milestone following the recent National technical foundation. Universities Commission (NUC) accreditation exercise carried out in October and November 2024.

A total of 53 academic programmes, spanning undergraduate and postgraduate levels, were evaluated—and every single one received full accreditation.

The extensive assessment covered faculties including Administration, Agriculture, Allied Health Sciences, Arts, Computing, Education, Engineering, Medicine, Pharmacy, Science, and Social Sciences.

According to a statement signed by the University Registrar, Malam Haruna Aliyu explained that the successful outcome marks a significant step forward for BUK in maintaining its reputation for academic distinction and high standards in programme delivery.

In the administration, 13 programmes were reviewed, including postgraduate degrees such as Master of Public Administration and MBA Business Administration, all of which received accredited status. Undergraduate courses in Accounting and Taxation were awarded accreditation.

The Faculty of Agriculture secured full accreditation for its Fisheries and Aquaculture programme, while the Allied Health Sciences Faculty achieved the same result for Environmental Health Science.

In Arts, programmes including Arabic Studies, French, Hausa, History, and Shariah all earned full accreditation, as did Forensic Science in the Computing Faculty.

The Faculty of Education emerged with 14 programmes, all fully accredited, including Early Childhood Education, Education Biology, and Library and Information Science.

Equally the Faculty of Engineering had programmes including Civil, Computer, Electrical, and Mechanical-all maintained full accreditation.

Similarly, the prestigious Medicine and Surgery programme, along with Pharmacy, have all secured full accreditation.

In the area of Science eight disciplines including Biochemistry, Industrial Chemistry, and Microbiology. In the same vein, Geography, Meteorology, Political Science, and Sociology were all confirmed to meet NUC's criteria and got full accreditation status.

The statement also explained that each programme's accreditation is valid for five years, assuring students and stakeholders of the quality and credibility of their chosen fields.

This recognition by the NUC ensures that graduates from these programmes are equipped with qualifications that are



nationally accepted for employment, further studies, and participation in the National Youth Service Corps (NYSC).

This was disclosed by Dr. Belle Louis Jinot, a senior official from the Open University of Mauritius, during his courtesy visit to the Vice-Chancellor of BUK, Professor Sagir Adamu Abbas, on Tuesday, 6th May, 2025.

Dr. Jinot, who is currently undertaking a two-week academic fellowship in education at BUK, stated that discussions between the two institutions have reached an

As part of his fellowship, Dr. Jinot participated in several academic activities including serving as an external examiner and presenting a seminar on *Gamification in* Open and Distance Learning, which was well-received by faculty members and postgraduate students. His insights on integrating game-based elements into educational design sparked engaging discussions on innovative teaching methods suitable for the African context.

Looking ahead, both institutions have agreed to draft a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to formalize their partnership. Key areas of focus will include joint research centres, collaborative online learning platforms, staff and student exchange, and joint academic conferences. The goal is to create a model of cross-border cooperation that enhances capacity and fosters resilience within African higher education systems.

The visit and the outcomes of Dr. Jinot's fellowship emphasize the growing momentum for intra-African academic partnerships that transcend borders and institutional silos. Stakeholders from both BUK and OUM expressed optimism that this collaboration would set the stage for more impactful engagements between African universities in pursuit of quality education and sustainable development.

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5th International Drylands Conference Calls for Bold Reforms, Inclusive Investment, and Stronger Action to Revitalize Rangelands

The 5th International Conference on Drylands, hosted by the Centre for Dryland Agriculture (CDA), Bayero University, Kano, concluded with a powerful appeal to governments, policymakers, and stakeholders to take urgent and coordinated steps to restore degraded rangelands, protect pastoralist livelihoods, and strengthen climate resilience across dryland regions.

Held from 6th to 8th May 2025 under the theme "*Promoting Sustainability and Resilience of Rangelands: Present and Future Outlooks*", the three-day event drew over 300 participants, including scientists, researchers, development practitioners, policymakers, and private sector representatives. Attendees came from 11 African countries, 13 Nigerian states, 17 academic institutions, and

several international organizations, making the conference a dynamic forum for dialogue, collaboration, and ideasharing.

In a communiqué issued at the close of the conference, participants called for the development and implementation of inclusive, evidence-based legal frameworks that prioritize responsible rangeland management. They advocated for policies that value and protect the traditional knowledge and practices of pastoralist communities, while guaranteeing fair access to land and natural resources. These frameworks, they argued, must ensure secure land tenure and transparent resource governance to support peaceful co-existence and reduce conflict over land use.

A major outcome of the gathering was the acknowledgment of the essential role that women and youth—especially those within pastoralist communities—play in building resilience. The conference recommended targeted investments in capacity-building, active involvement in decision-making, and support for income-generating ventures and resource development initiatives that benefit these groups.

Participants also stressed the need to expand investment from both the public and private sectors in climate adaptation strategies, land restoration technologies, and diversified livelihood programs. These efforts, they noted, should be supported by demand-led research and the integration of local knowledge with scientific innovation to generate tailored, practical solutions.

Recognizing the interconnected nature of dryland challenges, the conference called on development partners and international organizations to direct their efforts in line with the conference's outcomes and promote broader regional and global cooperation, especially around shared resources and cross-border issues. There was strong advocacy for deeper engagement with initiatives such as

the U.S.-led Vision for Adapted Crops and Soils (VACS), launched at the 2023 United Nations General Assembly, as well as the Africa Soil Initiative and related programs.

The private sector was urged to identify investment opportunities in rangeland-focused enterprises that balance profitability with environmental stewardship and social impact. Participants highlighted the potential of such enterprises to drive sustainable economic growth while preserving ecosystem functions.

The participants noted that the worsening condition of rangelands, the mounting challenges faced by pastoralists, and the increasing environmental pressures on drylands require more than policy talk—they demand urgent, collective, and ongoing action. Participants emphasized that restoring rangelands is essential for securing food supplies, maintaining ecological stability, and fostering peaceful communities.

In this spirit, the conference encouraged all stakeholders to harness the opportunity presented by the International Year of Rangelands and Pastoralists (IYRP) 2025. This global initiative, they said, offers a critical platform to raise awareness, build partnerships, and amplify action to ensure a sustainable future for rangelands in Nigeria, across the African continent, and globally.

The conference received support from several prominent organizations including the International Centre of Insect Physiology and Ecology (icipe) via the Regional Scholarship and Innovation Fund (RSIF), the International Maize and Wheat Improvement Center (CIMMYT), the International Crops Research Institute for the Semi-Arid Tropics (ICRISAT), the International Institute of Tropical Agriculture (IITA), the International Livestock Research Institute (ILRI), PACET, Nigeria's Federal Ministry of Agriculture and Food Security, Federal Ministry of Environment, Ministry of Livestock Development, and the Commonwealth Geographic Bureau (CGB).

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Among its core objectives, the conference aimed to share strengthen climate adaptation, food systems, and peace in cutting-edge research and practical insights on rangeland dryland areas. It also sought to cultivate partnerships that restoration, deepen engagement among key can drive research, influence policy, and build capacity actors-including policymakers, researchers, pastoralists, and civil society-and identify concrete strategies to



Rather than focusing solely on the popular commercial industry known as "Kannywood," Prof. Adamu takes a broader approach, examining Hausa cinema in its many -including diaspora productions,

"For two decades, Abdalla Uba Adamu has been the leading analyst of film culture in northern Nigeria. This magisterial work traces the origin of Hausa film, its rise to dominance, the controversies and censorship it provoked and the new direction it is taking."

This is not the first time Prof. Adamu has published with Bloomsbury. In 2019 he contributed two entries to the Bloomsbury *Encyclopedia of Popular Music of the World*,

Volume 12: Genres: Sub-Saharan Africa in which he contributed on Hausa Popular Music, Hausa Hip-Hop and Hausa Filmi Music.

With this announcement, and at 420 pages, Hausa cinema gains its most comprehensive and scholarly treatment, firmly placing it in the global conversation about media and culture.

The book is priced at \$130 (one hundred and thirty US dollars) hardback, and \$117 Ebook PDF. Due to this possible purchasing barrier, Prof. Adamu plans to publish a locally accessible companion book titled **Kannywood: A Brief Introduction** later this year in Kano. It will be tailored for readers interested in a concise, less theoretical overview of the development of Hausa cinema.
